### **Tall Ships Come to Galveston** *By P/C Chris Leavitt, JN*

Originally **Cdr Cathy** and I had planned to work the Galveston Squadron Booth at the Tall Ships at Galveston, but the price for the booth was over \$500, so the Galveston Squadron decided that the cost was too much and dropped out. Then Sea Scout Base Galveston asked us to help them and their booth – we had already planned to be there so – fine, we'll help SSBG. Are we popular or what? Several other Squadron members came down to help SSBG too – in addition to Cathy and me, **Lt/C George Crowl, AP** and **Lelaina Clayburg** were there Friday and Saturday, and there may have been other youth/adults that came down to see the ships and work at the SSBG booth on Sunday.

Saturday started out with a north wind and heavy mist – real boating weather, if you're dressed for it. As the day progressed, the wind picked up, the rain and mist dropped off, and the temperature fell into the trash can. One of the pictures shows the *Elissa* from astern, and the wind is causing her to heel at the dock – not a lot, but obvious. I'm not used to a 200-foot boat, but when the wind presses against the masts and rigging, the *Elissa* will lean right there at the dock. What was interesting was that the booths had almost no one there, the entertainers did very little business, the crowd was small – but the lines to go aboard the three Tall Ships were impressively long. For the most recent ship rigged vessel built in this country, the *Oliver Hazard Perry* (2015) the line was about 300 feet long – as long as the ship itself and halfway back again. The line for the Dutch built *Oosterschelde* (1918) was about 100 feet.

The ships were awesome. It was good to walk around and see history "on the hoof" – ok, "on the wind". It was good to be there, and good to get warm on the way home.

3. Starting in a month will be **an outreach program to an inorganic audience** (someone who is not a current member and not taking our courses) that includes young women and men in some older Boy Scouts of America programs (older Scouts and Venturing young adults), the Trail Life USA young men in the SeaNavigator program, the Girl Scouts of America and their "Juniors – Sailing and Navigation" program, the American Heritage Girls high adventure water activities such as canoeing, boating, or kayaking.
4. Work is started with other Committees to "sell our program" of education by reaching audiences outside our general scope, using those who market locally for us to find new avenues for membership and training, the new website nearing completion, and **asking each member, regardless of your activity level in the Squadron, to tell your friends about our excellent courses** and encourage them to become safer boaters through better education.

Whew! Life in 2018 will be fun and exciting. As a final item – each of you in America's Boating Club have individual experiences and levels of knowledge. Some of you will want to grow your knowledge base; some of you should be instructors for any of the courses. **Report from the USPS 2018 Annual Meeting**

The USPS 2018 Annual Meeting was held February 18-26 in Orlando, Florida. This week-long event featured various organizational meetings for all committees and departments within the organization. It also included an organizational exposition, seminars, and a variety of social events to promote interaction and networking of organizational leaders from across the country. The full meeting of the Governing Board took place on Saturday, with about 600 members attending.

This year was a Change of Watch for several of the Governing Board members. **Chief Commander Louis Ojeda** joined the ranks of the Past Chief Commanders after two years of leading the organization. **National Executive Officer Gary Dick Chaney** assumes the Chief Commander Role, and **National Administrative Officer Mary Paige Abbott** assumes the role of the National Executive Officer. **Ben Coons** is the newcomer on the Board, and takes over the role of the National Administrative Officer. The other roles of Secretary, Educational Officer, and Treasurer remain unchanged.

From our Houston Squadron, **Clare McDonald, SN** became the Rear Commander in charge of the Ship's Store. I concluded my term as the Rear Commander of the Boat Operator Certification Committee. My new role is now the Program Manager for the America's Boating Club Learning Centers. Another member of note, **Julie Bleisch, AP**, achieved her Life Member status with her 25<sup>th</sup> merit mark. Julie joins her husband, **Gary**, who received his life membership last year.

For the second year in a row, Houston Sail and Power Squadron distinguished itself in the teaching of public boating courses. In 2017, we won an award from the U. S. Coast Guard for teaching the most boating safety courses of any Squadron during the previous year. This year, that award was not presented by the Coast Guard, although Houston would likely have been the recipient if it were. Instead, we were recognized by Brunswick with their 2017 Boater Education Award. This award is given to Squadrons that partner with Brunswick dealers to teach boating safety courses. As the top Squadron in the country, we received the Platinum award, which came with a check for \$1,000.

The various reports from the bridge officers paint a picture of an organization that is moving strongly through a transition period. Membership was down slightly from last year. Much of this was due to the roll-off of free trial members, a program which inflated membership, but had a high turnover rate. That program is no longer in effect. Financially, the organization finished last year in the black. Cost reductions due to operational efficiencies and improved management have kept the organization on firm financial footing. Marketing for our organization, including the promotion of our new America's Boating Club brand, continues to be a focus.


A proposal was brought forward to address the issue of struggling Squadrons that fail to meet their obligations under the current bylaws due to lack of resources or organizational breakdown. The proposal would give the District Commander in conjunction with the National Executive Officer the authority to alter the operational structure of a struggling Squadron. The objective is to help prevent these Squadrons from dissolving and to allow them to grow and regain their vigor within the limitations of the National Bylaws. The proposal was approved.

On the Educational front, there was some progress made on the restructuring of the advance grade courses. A major change in the names of the advance grade courses was announced. This change was made to improve the marketing of the program, and to reflect updates in the curriculum itself. The new names are as follows:

- Seamanship becomes Boat Handling
- Piloting becomes Marine Navigation
- Advanced Piloting becomes Advanced Marine Navigation
- Junior Navigation becomes Offshore Navigation
- Navigation will become Celestial Navigation

Boat Handling is nearing release in its new structure. The new Marine Navigation is expected to be released sometime this summer. Offshore Navigation and Celestial Navigation will be updated after that. Note that the name changes do not affect the current grade system for members (S, P, AP, JN, and N). This system for recognizing educational achievements is under review, and will likely change in the future.

The various reports for meeting have now been posted on the USPS National web site. Hundreds of photos of the event have been posted as well. The next meeting of the Governing Board will take place August 12-19 in Minneapolis. The 2019 Annual Meeting will take place February 17-23 in Orlando.



**The movement to create a safe boating culture in all our communities has set sail, and the new BoatLive365.org website is live!**

Boat Live 365™ (pronounced like “alive”) is a movement to help raise awareness about boating safety 365 days a year, not just during boating season.

The website is a critical step to enable recreational boating advocates to more effectively educate our boating public year-round and lower the rate of boating accidents, incidents and fatalities nationwide.

[BoatLive365.org](http://BoatLive365.org) includes a collection of educational and promotional materials and best practices created and curated by United States Power Squadrons and other leading safe boating advocates, such as the U.S. Coast Guard, the National Safe Boating Council and the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA).

Topics on the website reflect key areas of interest prescribed by the U.S. Coast Guard (e.g., the dangers of cold-water immersion, the importance of wearing a life jacket, boating under the influence, etc.) to ensure that prioritized dangers, small and large, are kept top of mind for the boating public.

**According to the U.S. Coast Guard’s Boating Statistics, 77 percent of deaths occurred on boats where the operator did not receive boating safety instruction. In contrast, only 13 percent of deaths occurred on boats where the operator had received a nationally approved boating safety education certificate.**

# RECREATIONAL BOATING DATA COLLECTION THRU CROWDSOURCING


## SOBOS (Self-Reported On-Water Boat Operator Survey)

SOBOS is an iOS and Android mobile app, provides information about normal, non-accident based recreational boaters designed to mitigate recreational boating accidents. SOBOS asks recreational boat operators to fill out a short survey (~ 5-10 min) that permits a participant selected span of their next cruise to be tracked on-the-water. Both the anonymous survey and anonymous on-water data points are then linked to each on-water waypoint.

The goal of this project is to test the efficacy of crowdsourcing this data as an Evidence-based Public Health Approach to reducing boating accidents.

Participants will benefit:

1. At first altruistically, by participating in a public health/service project designed to reduce recreational boating accidents and fatalities
2. Later, by using SOBOS as a social networking tool enhance their “situational awareness” of the recreational boating that surrounds them; again, no personally identifying information is collected
3. Similar to the Waze app, participants can track their boat rides and inform others people about such things as floating debris, congestion in the harbor, broken down boat, etc.; all completely anonymously.



## An Evidence-Based Public Health Approach to Reducing Boating Accidents

1. Update marine rules & regulations (perhaps locally rather than one-size fits all).
2. New boating technology related risk reduction or mitigation (e.g., collision avoidance systems in new cars)
3. Improved focus on specific boat operator behavior modification that lower overall risk
4. Improved focus on specific boat operator behavior modification that lower risk
5. Valuable information about both safe and non-safe boat operator habits and behaviors

The difference between the SOBOS mobile tool and traditional chart plotters is that the data include more than simple waypoints. It is stacked with the day, time, latitude/longitude, and speed of the boat coupled with the anonymous on-water survey. In a future release of SOBOS, this anonymous information can be shared with other SOBOS participants permitting them to filter displayed waypoints

Commercial, governmental, and university partners benefit by having access to anonymous, non-accident-based on-water recreational boater data that can be used to study normal geospatial-temporal boating patterns, actuarial research, or boating accident research when compared to local recreational boating accidents. In summary, there are few ways that have not already been tried, to move the recreational boating accident/fatality needle. SOBOS, focused on recreational boating as an evidence-based public health approach, is a social networking tool that has the potential to make on-the-water recreational boating safer for both family and friends.

Current recreational boating network members included the United States Coast Guard, the National Safe Boating Council, the American Canoe Association, the US Army Corps of Engineers, National Marine Manufacturers Association, National Boating Federation, US Sailing, and the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators, the United States Power Squadrons, Boy Scouts of America, BoatUS/Geico, Brunswick Corporation, Grady White Boats, and SeaTow.
